Regina Baumhauer was born in Schwäbisch Gmünd. She studied in Stuttgart at the "Staatliche Akademie der bildenden Künste" and in Boston at "Boston University, SVA." She lives and works in New York City and Schwäbisch Gmünd. Her art has been featured in Stuttgart, Rottenburg, Aalen, Bonn, München, New York and Chicago, to name just a few places. Regina Baumhauer has received numerous awards and scholarships, including the Wettbewerb Ostwürttemberg für Malerei, Preis der Dietenberger-Mahringer Stiftung, Rotary Foundation, the award of the Wettbewerb "Kunst für Brüssel," and YADDO. According to critic Dominique Nahas "her work utilizes a wide variety of formats and includes drawings, prints, collages and paintings that incorporate figurative aspects, ornamentation and abstraction." At the residency at Saratoga Springs, New York, she developed important parts of her artistic vocabulary of the ongoing "Open Letter Series," which also includes the cover image. The richly textured canvases of this series develop through drawing, silkscreen, and embroidery. The finish is done in oil, inviting the eye and the mind of the viewer to explore.
