Adolf Fleischmann

Adolf Fleischmann was born in 1892 in Esslingen. He studied at the Stuttgart School of Applied Arts and the Royal Academy of Art before joining the German army in World War I. After a severe battlefield injury, he returned to Stuttgart to work as an illustrator and later moved to Zürich, where he became the draftsman and camouflager of the canton hospital. During the 1920s Fleischmann was influenced by Cubism and Expressionism and exhibited with the 'Neue Sezession' in Munich (1921 and 1928) as well as in Berlin and in Stuttgart. In 1932 he exhibited at the Paris Salon des Surindépendants. A purely abstract artist, Fleischmann emigrated to France in 1933 and subsequently spent extended periods of time in Italy, Spain, and France, where he also exhibited regularly. Towards the end of the 1930s, his compositions developed into a rigid geometry and his typical Lshaped forms. In 1952 Fleischmann settled in New York where he created his first relief-paintings and also worked as a draftsman at Columbia University. In 1965 he returned to Germany, where he died in 1968.


