His work has been included in the permanent collection at the National 9/11 Museum in New York City at Ground Zero, which opens in September 2012. Tom Bloch lives and works in Stuttgart as a freelance journalist, photographer, and author, working with newspapers, magazines, radio, TV and book-projects.


The Heidelberg Center for American Studies (HCA) is a central academic institution of the Ruprecht–Karls–Universität Heidelberg.
