Edmund Daniel Kinzinger

Edmund Kinzinger was born in Pforzheim in 1888. He attended the Knirr Schule in Munich, the Art Academies in Munich and Stuttgart as well as the Academie Moderne in Paris. After serving in World War I, Kinzinger returned to the Art Academy in Stuttgart and then taught in Munich from 1924 to 1928. Kinzinger married Alice Fish, an American, in 1927 and then traveled and eventually moved to America where he taught at the Minneapolis Art Institute and painted in Taxco, Mexico. He returned to Germany to become director of the Hans Hofmann Schule für Bildende Kunst in Munich but had to flee Nazi Germany in 1933, first to France, then to the United States, where he became director of the art department at Baylor University in Waco, Texas. In 1942 Kinzinger earned the first doctorate in fine arts conferred by the University of Iowa. From 1944 to 1948, he spent his summers painting in Taos. Kinzinger stopped painting in 1948 and moved first to Wisconsin, then to North Carolina, where he died in 1963.


