# The Baden-Württemberg Seminar of The Heidelberg Center for American Studies

Each spring and fall, the Heidelberg Center for American Studies invites distinguished scholars, public policy experts, journalists, writers, and artists to its Baden–Württemberg Seminar. The program was initiated in the spring of 2007. Participants present their current work, discuss issues of transatlantic interest, or read from their writings at selected institutions throughout the state.

#### **Emanuel Leutze**

Emanuel Gottlieb Leutze was born in Gmünd, Württemberg, in 1816 and came to the United States as a child. He received his first art instruction in Philadelphia and supported himself painting portraits after the death of his father. In the 1840s, Leutze studied at the Kunstakademie Düsseldorf and in Munich and visited Venice and Rome. His iconic pictures "Washington Crossing the Delaware" and "Washington Rallying the Troops" were painted in Düsseldorf to encourage European revolutionaries. In 1859 Leutze returned to the United States where he once more dedicated himself to portrait painting. In 1860 the U.S. Congress commissioned him to decorate a stairway in the capitol building with a large composition, "Westward the Course of Empire Takes Its Way." Leutze died in Washington, D.C. in 1868. Our cover shows Catherine Van Rensselaer Schuyler (1734–1803), wife of General Philip Schuyler, setting fire to her wheat fields during the Battle of Saratoga to keep them from the enemy, whose imminent arrival is announced by a messenger.
